On Sunday night, comedian Steve Harvey will declare Ocala's Miguel Secillano "the greatest math mind of all time."

No joke. Miguel is a 7-year-old

third-grader at Dr. N.H. Jones Elementary School.

Also no joke. But there will be plenty of jokes and giggles when Harvey squares off with Miguel for an unfair battle of wits on NBC's "Little Big Shots." The TV show starts its third season Sunday night with Miguel as one of the featured children whose talents, Harvey proclaims, are "off the hook."

Senior Learners going strong

More than 900 people, most in their 70s, have taken non-college credit courses since the fall

More than three years ago, the College of Central Florida announced it could no longer use staff to support the popular Senior Learning Institute. The college promised to provide classrooms for courses if volunteers were willing to oversee the program.

That's how the non-profit Senior Learners Inc. was born. Since then, volunteers have responded and helped organize and schedule several hundred courses, from history and science to travel and computers. Volunteers collect nominal fees, averaging about \$30 for multi-day classes, to pay lecturers.

Today, the popular education program, aimed at residents age 50 or older, is booming. Some 949 people, most in their 70s, have taken non-college credit courses since last fall. Those students are expected to surpass 5,000 class hours during the 2017-18 college term that began in August.

Though these seniors have a thirst for new knowledge, a major draw for the Greatest Generation is socialization, according to Gwynn Peeler, 72, the vice chairwoman of the group and one of dozens of lecturers. Students often arrive in the classroom 45 minutes early to chat with friends.

Peeler, a retired biology teacher, has a dedicated following
