

Citrus' jobless rate rises to 5.2%

Seasonal uptick no cause for alarm says employment expert

Citrus County's June unemployment rate was 5.2%, up from 4.6% in May but down from 5.6% in June 2018. Citrus was tied with Sumter

County for the third-worst unemployment rate in the state, according to numbers released Friday by the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity (FDEO).

Citrus County's labor force in June grew by 62 to 48,666 people from a month earlier. The number of people employed dropped by 223 to 46,157 and the number of unemployed increased by 285 to 2,509 over the month.

The numbers look better compared to a year ago, when the jobless rate was 5.6%. Compared to last year, the labor force grew by 308, the number of employed rose by 508 and the number of unemployed fell by 200.

Monroe County had the state's lowest unemployment rate at 2.4%, followed by St. Johns County and Okaloosa County (2.9% each), Walton County (3.0%) and Orange

County (3.1%).

Hendry County had the highest unemployment rate at 6.6%, followed by Hardee County (5.9%).

Florida's unemployment was 3.5% in June, up from 3.1% from the month before. The national rate was 3.8%, up from 3.4% in May.

Citrus County Sheriff's deputies shot an armed Lecanto man who had barricaded himself in a home Friday evening with two hostages, authorities said

The man, identified by his mother as

Salvador "Bo" Salazar, 35, was taken by ambulance to a waiting helicopter at the College of Central Florida parking lot. He was flown to an Ocala hospital where his condition was unknown Friday night, officials said.

No officers were injured, authorities said. Salazar released the hostages unharmed before the standoff ended, they said.

A three-hour standoff began around 5 p.m. when a Citrus County Sheriff's deputy responded to a call to the 1200 block of West High Acres Street, just north of Cardinal Street and off of County Road 491, Sgt. Lee Carey said.

The call was about a barricaded,

suicidal man with hostages, Carey said.

Carey would not provide details of the gunfire and he would not identify the deputy involved. He said investigators have not determined if Salazar fired at officers.

Blame it on the rain: Halls River bridge completion delayed again

Opening now pushed to mid-August

You've seen this headline before: Substantial completion of the Halls River Bridge widening project has been pushed back again.

It was supposed to be done by

the end of July. But Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) spokeswoman Kris Carson said the date is now mid-August.

Carson blamed the delay on weather.

"We've been dealing with seasonal rains with 10-plus rain

On a more positive note, the bridge is now open to two-way traffic.

"It has opened up the roadway and bridge from the tight conditions which previously existed," Carson said.

Substantial completion means traffic will be placed in its final

> This bridge replacement project started in January 2017 and it was supposed to finish by spring 2018. There was to be minimal obstruction to the public, officials said at the time — six months of one-lane traffic.

Then came the delays. Reasons for them were many; most had to do with the ground.

Workers early on experienced hard layers of weathered limestone. Depressions formed. There were problems with bridge pilings and seawall. Reinforcements for concrete columns had to be installed. The
