### **Citrus County COVID** update

According to the Florida Department of Health, 93 new positive cases were reported in Citrus County since the latest update. Two new hospitalizations were reported; two new deaths were reported.

To date in the county, 4,218 people have tested positive (including 21 nonresidents), 391 have been hospitalized and 157 have died.

#### Citrus' jobless **rate up 0.2%**

According to the preliminary jobs data for October, released Friday, Nov. 20, 2020. by the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity, Citrus County's jobless rate was 6.5%, 0.2% higher than September.

**Neighboring Levy** County continues to hold the lowest jobless rate in the region at 4.9%, up 0.4 percentage point over the month; followed by Marion County at 5.6%, an increase of 0.3%. Citrus County's labor shrunk by just 8 to 45,592; the number of people employed decreased by 112 to 42,614 and the number of unemployed rose by 104 to 2,978. In October 2019,



# County Education Association pushes for members

Leaders of the Citrus County Education Association are confident they will have enough members in the local teachers' union for recertification before 2021.

Victoria Smith, president of the association (CCEA), said Wednesday, Nov. 18, 2020, the organization derstand

had 21 members in its ranks.

It has to reach a roster of 25 — 50% of its membership — in order for the Teacher Evaluation Review Committee, or TERC, to qualify the CCEA as a bargaining unit, giving it the ability to negotiate employment terms and conditions for union and non-union instructors.

"I think a lot of people don't un-
