Like I said, while still in the planning stages if it's anything like the virtual youth career expo we just held in Marion County, it should exceed expectations. Naturally, in-person events are limited by the size of the venue and the ability to get students to and from that venue. This year, add the whole issue of social distancing. Granted, the Marion County expo starts off larger due to the larger student population, and typically, we have 800-900 students take part over the course of two days. By going virtual, we were able to reach a record number of attendees (1,413) by opening the event to home school, private and parochial students, as well as public schoolers.


